#### FIRE/LAND Community Resilience Forum Speakers

Elena DeLacy, Executive Director, American River Conservancy (ARC)

Elena has worked with ARC since 2003, when she completed an internship to restore habitat for the threatened California red-legged frog. During her four-year tenure as Executive Director, the organization has permanently protected 3,500 acres of riparian habitat and forested lands in the Upper American River and Upper Cosumnes River watersheds. Ms. DeLacy holds a B.S. in Environmental Biology and Management from UC Davis. She serves as the Board Secretary of the Sierra Cascade Land Trust Council and is current President of the non-profit Friends of Sly Park. Elena is an active musician (violin, vocalist), performing with local bands Hither & Yon, Flannel, and Main Street Collective.

Mark Egbert, District Manager, El Dorado & Georgetown Divide Resource Conservation Districts

Mark Egbert is a Resource Management Specialist with over 25 years of experience working at all levels of government and community. An EDC native, he provides guidance on planning, policy, administration, program development and technical assistance for programs from K-12 education to landscape-scale watershed management. His experience includes Dam Remediation, Soil and Water Resource Management, Forest Landscape Restoration, Ecological Monitoring/Assessment, Community Resource Management, and Biomass Utilization.

Ken Pimlott, CAL FIRE Director (Retired); EDC Office of Wildfire Preparedness and Resilience

Ken started with CAL FIRE in 1987 as a seasonal fire fighter, and ultimately worked his way through the ranks to Director and California's State Forester, a position he held from 2010 until his retirement in December 2018. Chief Pimlott has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Forest Resource Management from Humboldt State University and is a Registered Professional Forester in CA. Ken continues to work on fire and forest management initiatives and is currently working with EDC and the Fire Safe Council to implement wildfire preparedness and resilience programs.

Susan Kocher, Extension Forester/Forestry Advisor, UC Cooperative Extension, Central Sierra Nevada

Susie Kocher provides forestry advice to private landowners throughout CA through the Forest Stewardship Education Initiative. She has founded a Post-fire Forest Resilience education program to help forest landowners learn about restoring forests and connecting to supports. She has been doing prescribed fire education since 2018 and founded the El Dorado/Amador and the Motherlode PBAs in 2021 to help private landowners learn how to use prescribed fire on their own property. She is a Registered Professional Forester and lives in South Lake Tahoe.

Becky Estes, PhD, Central Sierra Province Ecologist, US Forest Service

Becky Estes has served as the USDA Forest Service Central Sierra Province Ecologist with the Region 5 Ecology Program, a boundary-spanning organization that provides expertise fundamental to sustainable, science-based, multiple-use land management. Based in Placerville, she has spent 10 years working with the Eldorado, Tahoe and Stanislaus National Forests and Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit providing assistance on complex management needs such as forest resilience, climate change and guidance on inventory/monitoring.

Malissa Tayaba, Vice Chair, Shingle Springs Band of Miwok Indians

Malissa Tayaba serves on the governing Tribal Council of the Shingle Springs Band of Miwok Indians, a federally recognized Indian tribe whose mission is to protect and enhance the quality of life of its members by preserving, protecting and promoting its history, culture and traditions; promoting self-sufficiency and a strong work ethic; exercising the powers of self-government and sovereign immunity; while providing social, health, economic and educational resources, opportunities and services that contribute to the well-being of the tribal community.

Kit Veerkamp, Licensed Landscape Architect (retired); CA Native Plant Society

Kit is a UC Master Gardener with over 40 years of experience designing residential, commercial, institutional, and public works projects throughout the region. While serving on the Sacramento District's Board and the Chapter's Advocacy Committee, she is also the Horticulture Chair and Plant Sale Coordinator for the El Dorado Chapter of the California Native Plant Society and California Naturalist. She teaches courses on improving soils, pollinator gardens, natural pest management, water-wise gardening, habitat gardening, and fire-resiliency.

Rina Wakefield, Writer and Poet

Rina has written and produced for Ms. Magazine.com. Her poetry has been featured in The Mt. Democrat, the literary journals Community Soliloquies, Lantern Magazine, and Coalesce. She is a Master's Degree candidate in Library Science in Rare Book Curation at San Jose State University. She holds a B.A. Degree in English Literature from CSU Sacramento. She is working on a book based on the female lineage of her Indigenous and Native American heritage, descending from the Purepecha people of the Michoacán region of Mexico.

Indigo Moor, Poet, Writer; Poet Laureate Emeritus, Sacramento

Indigo Moor's 4th book of poetry *Everybody's Jonesin'* for *Something*, took 2nd place in U. of Nebraska Press' Backwater Prize. His 2nd book, *Through the Stonecutter's Window*, won Northwestern U. Press's Cave Canem prize. His 1st and 3rd books, *Tap-Root* and *In the Room of Thirsts & Hungers*, were in Main Street Rag's Editor's Select Poetry Series. He is an adjunct professor at Dominican Univ. and visiting faculty for Dominican's MFA program. He is a former Stonecoast MFA program faculty, where he earned an MFA in poetry, fiction, and scriptwriting.

Autumn Gronborg, Forest Restoration Manager, American River Conservancy

Autumn has worked with the American River Conservancy since Jan of 2015, managing the American River Headwaters Acquisition and Restoration Project as well as writing and planning forest management plans for the extensive lands held by the Conservancy. Autumn holds a Bachelor of Science in Forestry and Natural Resources Management from the University of Georgia.

Dr. Ryoei Tyler, Chair of the Int'l Division of Enryakuji Issan Gyokobo; Abbot of Tendaisyu, USA Dr. Tyler has a Ph.D. in Pure Mathematics from UC and Honzan Tokudo ordination at Enryakuji, principal temple, Tendaisyu, Shiga, Japan. As Grand Ajari and Chief Overseas Missionary of Enryakuji. she helps propagate Tendai Buddhism outside of Japan. She trains Tendai Priests, confers Tokudo Ordinations, and offers sutra chanting, study and discussions for all those who seek the teachings of Buddhism.

#### An Art Rock Opera for the Forest

"A tree is a solid and constant being, free of human weaknesses like discontent and striving." So wrote John Muir, environmental philosopher and early advocate for land preservation. A tree is not an isolated being but part of an interconnected network on which life everywhere depends. That's where the FIRE/LAND begins, with notions about survival, including our own.

We inhabit. We get lost. But, we must remember: "The clearest way into the Universe is through a forest wilderness." -FIRE/LAND Libretto



FIRE/LAND's Act 1, a blend of historical fact and fiction opens in 1910 at the official birth of the US Forest Service, led by Gifford Pinchot, buddy of Teddy Roosevelt. In contrast to John Muir's pure conception of conservation, U.S. government and industries put policies in place for fire suppression and timber extraction, as well as mining, water, agricultural use. "Wild," "exploited," "settled"—these are European concepts of land. Wildfire, like nature more broadly, was ignorantly assumed to be under human control. From the Montana/Idaho "Big Burn" fire of 1910, to the mega-fires in our midst, we arrive at the present moment around wildfire and climate grief and recovery.

Act 2 commemorates the Caldor Fire and honors local Native American approaches to land and using fire to revitalize it. An Oracle who can see our past, present and future guides Act 3. From Svante Arrhenius, Swedish scientist who, in 1895, accurately calculated global warming, to todays's climate scientists whose predictions have yet to be heeded, and finally, to updated strategies for using prescribed fire for protection and restoration, this art work aims to offer hope and resilience for the land and for our future.

#### Who's Who In FIRE/LAND

Ameera Godwin, (Concept/Libretto/Original Video & Projections) Co-founder, Myrtle Tree Arts. In 2022, she was artistic director/video artist for Earth Dayta: Media, Music, and Real World Data in Performance with Nature. She earned a B.A. in Media Study, Art & Performance from the Center for Media Study, U. of Buffalo and a Master's Degree in Interactive Telecommunications, Tisch School of the Arts, New York University. She directed documentaries, garnering film festival awards and her artwork has appeared in performances and exhibitions in Latvia, Estonia, Portugal, and the US. She received a Sacramento Region Community Foundation Arts Fellowship to create FIRE/LAND. Ameera is a certified UC Climate Steward.

Paul Godwin, (Composer/Music Director/Keyboards/Vocals/John Muir) Co-founder Myrtle Tree Arts. With over three decades of international experience creating and empowering musical events, with Miguel Noya he formed Dogon in 1985. They have recorded and performed eight albums on NEWdOG Records, been praised in WIRED, Billboard, Keyboard and Spin Magazines and were nominated for a California Music Award as Best Electronic Artist. Paul is the recipient of the Bay Area Critics Circle Best Composer Award for his theatrical score of Tony Kushner's Homebody/Kabul in its West Coast Premiere at Berkeley Repertory Theatre. He holds a B.A. in Music Production & Engineering from Berklee College of Music, Boston.

**Miguel Noya (Composer)** Venezuelan musical pioneer and educator. Miguel Noya has over 15 albums to his name and continues to collaborate and release ground-breaking electronic music worldwide. His concerts in Europe and South America feature his design for surround sound psycho-acoustic environments. In 2021, he was awarded a musical residency in Berlin by The Goethe Institute. He presented *Possible Horizons* for Venezuela at the XLI Venice Biennale and *Sailing Future* at World Expo Lisboa. Noya is a composer and electronic musician working with Paul Godwin (Dogon) since 1981 and Ameera since 1989, his family with whom he shares the power of The Muse. He loves running up that hill.

Aron Faria (Composer/Guitar) is a local composer/musician who moved to El Dorado County 5 years ago. After receiving a degree in music composition from CSU Stanislaus, Aron spent many years performing with music groups large and small across the state. He has released material with Freedom to Forage, Strange Brew, and An Epic Theory in the progressive, jazz, classical, and post-rock genres. A lifelong student and teacher, Aron welcomes any chance to create new music with like-minded individuals. In 2020 Aron joined Dogon for their release, Fragments/Far Journeys. Now a regular member of the Main Street Collective, Aron is happy to have settled into the Foothill life with his wife Jessica.

**Gavin Sellers-Norman (Theatrical Director)** is the full time Theatre Arts Instructor at Meristem and Adjunct Professor of Acting at Folsom Lake College and CSU Sacramento. He holds a B.A. in Theatre Arts from Sacramento State University, is a graduate of Dell'Art Int'l School of Physical Theatre and of Mime and Contact Improvisation Training with Pilobolus and PUSH Physical Theatre. Gavin is an avid LGBTQIA+ advocate in El Dorado County, and founded and produced APPLECORE Fringe Festival (2017-18) bringing over 21 original theatrical production emphasizing queer experience and leadership from across the US to venues in Placerville CA.

**Kimberly ShiningStar Petree (Storyteller)** is direct descendant of the Indigenous people of El Dorado County, the Tume'lay Nisenan Miwok, aka the El Dorado Band of Miwok Indians and the Executive Director of Cosumnes Culture and WaterWays. She is a professional storyteller with a unique ability to intertwine history, science, and traditional stories to inspire personal responsibility.

**Zack Dowell, Laika's Last Wish (Composer/Synthesizers)** is a lifelong tinkerer, musician, and maker, who for over 20 years has coordinated the efforts of the Folsom Lake College Innovation Center, discipline-agnostic makerspace and hub for innovation. He provides training, resources, and energy for the development of new approaches to teaching and learning. The Center's projects include explorations of bioacoustics, infrasound, and data sonification/physicalization.


